



ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT



Mojaz focuses on economic well-being and quality of life for marginalized and poor communities by supporting income generation activities and expanding livelihood options; thereby giving them hope to constructively contribute to their communities. This essentially entails a strong focus on the enhancement of people's ability to become self-sustainable so that they can generate adequate resources for meeting the requirements of the self and household on a sustainable basis with dignity.

In year we reached over 3,700 people directly through our economic development projects. Over 49% of these were female.

Strengthening Vegetable Value Chain in Pakistan

In order to boost household incomes and livelihoods of small farmers. Mojaz Foundation is implementing a 3year long value chain project in District Muzaffargarh. The project is a component of the Agriculture Value Chain Collaborative Research Program (AVCCR), by the Australian Centre for International Agricultural Research (ACIAR), through which the Australian Government is supporting continued investment in Pakistan. The overarching goal of the AVCCR Program is that the rural poor, living in Punjab and Sindh, significantly and equitably benefit from improvements in strategically selected agricultural value chains. The project would help small farmers produce healthy and profitable onion, potato, tomato and chili crops to enhance their socioeconomic conditions, with particular focus on women.

Ehsaas Programme - Interest Free Loan Scheme

Mojaz Foundation is implementing Ehsaas Programme - Interest Free Loan (IFL) Scheme of the Government of Pakistan funded through Pakistan Poverty Alleviation Fund since 2014. The IFL is a social protection scheme designed for the ultra-poor, who are below the poverty line according to the Poverty Score Card data conducted by Benazir Income Support Program.

The IFL Scheme aims at providing economic support to the ultra poor for income generation and employability targeting men, women and youth. The beneficiaries under this scheme are also given trainings on record keeping, savings, and enterprise development.

MF is implementing this scheme in the districts of Muzaffargarh. Narowal and Bahawalnager. The loan size is between PKR 20,000 to 35000. These loans are utilized for livestock, enterprise and agricultural activities. 49% of the total clients are women, who invest the loan in home-based businesses, like embroidery and textile products and build linkages with fashion houses to increase employment and promote culture. This scheme has helped to develop livestock and industrial value chains and address the drivers of poverty in a local context.











Ehsaas Programme - Interest Free Loan Scheme restored Bashir Ahmed's courage

Bashir Ahmad, a father of 4 children, is a resident of a small village of Baseera in District Muzaffargarh of Punjab province in Pakistan. His courage to take risk and try out an area for business, that no one else could think of was the key to his success.

Who so ever Bashir discussed his unique idea of Miswak making, every one would oppose the idea. Considering the financial crisis and being the only breadwinner of the family, Bashir took the risk of starting the business on his own in partnership with his wife. In 2016, MOJAZ Foundation team visited several villages in the district to select beneficiaries for Ehsaas Programme - Interest Free Loan Scheme in the following days. Bashir Ahmed's idea of Miswak making was highly appreciated and PKR 20,000 was provided to him as part of this programme.

Bashir Ahmed and his wife collected miswak from the jungle and sold them in Mela, to Jamia Masjid on Fridays and on Eid days. He invested the loan amount on his business and slowly it began bringing him good profit and confidence to expand the business.

These days, Bashir Ahmed has started supplying miswak in Peshawar, Rawalpindi, Lahore and Multan. Also, he has employed 09 people from his native village and have a vehicle for transportation. Moreover, he has started sending his children to school.

In recognition of his success as a micro-entrepreneur and his positive contribution in community, Bashir Ahmed received the 13th Citi-PPAF Micro-entrepreneurship Award in Islamabad on March 12th, 2019.

EDUCATION




Mojaz Foundation aims at increasing access and retention (by 60%) in targeted communities through institutionalizing key driving factors and actors by engaging stakeholders by promoting education rights in target communities to break barriers to education (specially girls' education). The organization believes in enhancing adequate and quality education on sustainable basis by building institutional capacities and promote resource mobilization

In year we reached over 72,490 people directly through our 2018-19, education projects and over 473,400 people indirectly.

ILMPOSSIBLE-Take a Child to School (TACS)-Phase II

Mojaz Foundation believes that a good quality, publiclyfunded education should be available to all children. In order to make it possible. Mojaz Foundation joined hands with British Council and it strategic partners for the Project "ILM-POSSIBLE: Take a Child to School". Since 2015, we have achieved very encouraging milestones. Currently, MF is involved in the scaling up of the program, focusing on retention and monitoring of the targets achieved during the first phase of the project. During the year 2018-2019. almost 2000 out-of-school children are enrolled in schools due to efforts of volunteers. Mohallah Committees and the district government.

Besides school enrollment, TACS-Phase II project also focuses on providing an enabling and a positive learning environment created through life skills and sports, encouraging school retention through DOSTI Programme. Through this program, TACS project team successfully carried out baseline survey. District level DOSTI sports event and various sessions in DOSTI schools across District Bahawalnagar in Punjab.



Moreover, the implementation of Mohalla Committe Social Action Plans has brought positive changes in the community, like improving school infrastructure, distribution of books and uniforms to the needy students. These efforts have increased school enrolment rate and improved the educational conditions of District Bahawalnagar.

"I felt very happy to see that the students and teachers have come from Govt schools and Mojaz Foundation organized such a great Sports event. Investing in School environment to create positive impact on learning

Mojaz Foundation through its various projects on education has brought together community leaders, teachers, parents and children, to ensure that all school aged children have access to quality education. Thus, during the enrollment campaign of TACS Project, Phool Mohalla Committee (PMC) visited schools of their Union Council 42/Fateh in BahawalNagar region to identify the missing facilities in schools, a reason in reducing the enrollment rate. After baseline assessment, a School GES 105/Fateh was identified with infrastructural issues, like broken walls of school building missing doors and windows, dull and dirty corridors. Such conditions in school affected the learning environment and academic performance of students.

In order to resolve these issues, the members of PMC devised a social action plan to mobilize the community to raise funds and collect donations from notable community members, affluent farmers and traders by informing them about poor infrastructure of the school and improve the school learning environment.

Henceforward, with the help of donations and school development fund, those issues were resolved and corridor walls were painted and decorated, giving a whole new outlook to the school this has increased students' enrollment and gave them a chance to learn in a better school facility.

Under TACS project, DOSTI is a highly interactive programme that focuses on the key aspects of the learning environment in school, and incorporates activities both inside and outside the classroom to promote a higher level of engagement.

All from Bahawalnagar left school in grade 1 because of his mother passed away. He sold samosas to students he once studied with. Watching his friends' taking part in the DOSTI programme inspired All to join too. Today he is enrolled in a school and actively participating in sports competitions, thus realising his true potential.

"DOSTI has instilled into us a life-long love of physical activities and storytelling. This experience has improved our abilities to do better and learn more in classrooms," said Ali.

WASH & NUTRITION

Mojaz implemented several long term projects during the reporting period to increase equitable access to water and sanitation by enabling communities to find innovative local solutions to address issues related to child mortalities and health and hygiene with special focus on women and children.

In year we reached over 351,000 people directly through 2018-19, our WASH projects. Over of these were female.

Scale-up of MHM Model in ICT

Mojaz Foundation has been taking multiple initiatives across Pakistan with the technical and financial support from various donors to ensure that communities have access to improved water, sanitation and hygiene facilities. Without hygiene interventions, it's impossible to maintain enabling and clean environment for children. women and people with special needs in deprived and vulnerable areas.

There is an increasing recognition of the impact that Menstrual Hygiene Management (MHM) practices can have on health, education and psycho-social outcomes for women and girls in developing countries. And schools are the best mode of imparting knowledge regarding MHM and creating awareness through a never ending network. Mojaz Foundation implemented a project on Menstrual Hygiene Management (MHM) titled "Scale up of MHM in ICT" in 20 public schools of Islamabad with the financial support from WaterAid Pakistan. The larger objective of the project was to develop a model of "Girls Friendly Toilets" in schools where the girls can manage menstruation with safety, dignity and privacy.

Under this project, Mojaz Foundation also covered the important aspects of Clean and Green Pakistan Movement, such as Environmental Hygiene, Tree Plantation, Waste Management.

We are thankful to WaterAid Pakistan, Federal Directorate of Education, Area Education Officers, Principals, teachers and the brilliant students from all project schools for their support and meaningful participation in the project.







Improved WASH Services to Reduce WASH Borne Disease Project

Pakistan ranks among the top five countries with the highest under-five (U5) mortality globally, and nearly one tenth of its children do not live to see their fifth birthday. Diarrhea (water borne disease) remains a leading cause of childhood morbidity and mortality with 53,300 children dying from diarrhea each year despite simple treatment guidelines and decades of concerted efforts. In Punjab, the most populous province in Pakistan, 26,000 children die from diarrhea annually.

Mojaz Foundation is implementing a Reckitt Benckiser Pakistan supported project via WaterAid Pakistan in the Faisalabad and Hafizabad. The field districts of implementation in Faisalabad started in February and received meaningful attention/support from local level authorities. This project aims to improve Water, Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH) services to reduce WASH borne diseases especially Diarrhea through programming and achieving integrated environment" in thirteen (13) Union Councils of Faisalabad. The major interventions carried out under this project are:

- Establishment and training of village WASH committees to sustain the changed behavior of communities
- · Formation of School WASH Clubs
- Increase access to improved sanitation facilities at community level
- Improved Sanitation facilities at BHUs/Schools level
- Tree Plantation and Solid Waste management under Clean Green Pakistan Movement
- Street Theater Performances
- Latrine construction as per Sanitation Community Action Plan

The project has used different creative ways such as street theaters to mobilize people to realize the importance of keeping their environment clean and sustaining their ODF status.

Safe and Cleaner Water for a Healthy and Cleaner Life

In many places where we work, Mojaz Foundation brings change for the long term in fragile settings, where communities are especially vulnerable. We help provide better health and WASH facilities for building a safe and cleaner life standards.

Village WASH Committee (VWC) of Village 6JB, Tehsil Faisalabad Saddar were upset because of the prevailing poor health conditions, particularly the usage of contaminated water, they were drinking and bathing in Residents of the village complained about falling sick because of water borne diseases, especially children having diarrhea. These sicknesses regularly resulted in hospital visits, which created unplanned medical expenses, taking a significant toll on the family.

Mojaz Foundation Team sat down with the VWC members to learn about the gravity of the problem and the causes leading to the problem. The team spread awareness to community about Health and Hygiene, good hygiene practices and various WASH interventions and facilities. They emphasized upon the importance of good health, dumping of solid waste and safe drinking water for a healthy life.

Members of VWC and their president, Mr. Abdul Maalik soon realized the need of providing safe and clean water facility in their village. With the help of community support, both physically and financially, they were able to install a filtration plant in the premises of village's mosque. To ensure sustainability of their efforts, members of VWC took the lead responsibilities for monitoring and maintenance of the water filtration plant.

After successful implementation of VWCs action plan, now people have access to safe and clean drinking water. In addition to saving money on medical treatment, the residents of Village 6JB, no longer have to spend precious financial resources on purchasing clean water. Knowing the families no longer have to worry about waterborne diseases, Mr. Abdul Malik looks forward to a much more promising future.
